At the Songwriters Original Showcase in Ambler, artists perform everything from folk to jazz in an "unplugged, unplugged kind of way."

Rick Denison was tired of the noise — the grinding of coffee beans and the whir of cappuccino machine churning out their frothy blends, the chatter that escalated from person to person through the various booths that flowed as freely as the beers and \$2 drink specials. And he was tired of the requests — Von McMenamy's "I'm a Star," David Lee Roth's "If You Go," "Escape" and "Smash." Report, Please?

writer, the Ambler resident was sick of having his original lyrics fall on the ears of the few individuals in a crowded bar or cafeteria who actually cared to listen.

"I've always wanted to be able to be part of a performance venue that's a listening room," said Denison. "You know, no one else is there — no other performers. It's very difficult to get your stuff on the radio or to break out. You gotta go to a club and they sell beer and it bugs the bar owner's pants more to have to bring in a bunch of

people to hear your music."

Denison and Lee

playhouse in February.

Five months later, the acoustic performances, featuring regional, local and national acts in five- to seven-set sets at a time, have drawn mostly local musicians hoping to be exposed to the launching of their careers.

If the music can be mixed with an acoustic guitar or piano and the artists already have a commercially available recording via Web site, then it's time to move on to the next act.

"The whole idea was to put together a venue dedicated to helping unsigned artists," Denison said, "and to continue that

ambition. People really want to hear new music. They're just not able to be exposed to it."

The showcase is sponsored by Ambler Entertainment Inc., the Ambler-based recording studio and independent label started by Denison and Lansdale resident Stephen Skorn in 1991.

Lee, a Quakertown native

who currently resides in Ambler, handles promotion for Skorn and also is one of its artists.

Denison, an award-winning songwriter with three albums to his credit, serves as producer and arranger for the band on her 1998 release, "Mystical Thing."

Both she and Denison will

perform in this weekend's showcase, along with Daylestown musician and "drum-guy" inventor Vigidad — also known as Bersie Capodici, prolific Philadelphia songwriter and RaftHouse/Columbus performing artist Ben Arnall, Chesterian native Carol Lester and Philadelphia musicans virtuous and composer Stephen DiJoseph.

Capodici, whose drum gun

was the forerunner of many of the electronic drum and percussion devices used today and whose music fuses percussion beats with acoustic melodies for a new-age funk sound, has been performing with Denison since SOS's start.

His exploration of unusual sounds on customized instruments often is under-appreciated in the more rowdy bars where he has played, he said.

"If you're in a nightclub, that's always scary," he said, "because it's original music. Here, there's absolutely more

appreciation, which is really good because the stuff I do is really mood music in a sense."

Peter Spencer, a New Hope songwriter and finger-picking guitarist who performed at SOS last month, likes the comfort of the Act II Playhouse.

Traveling to last month's show from an enchanting festival in western Pennsylvania, he arrived to find his world ratings on a set in a "real grown room" for an hour before the show.

"The overall comfort level is so much higher for the performers," he said, "and for the audience, too. Plus, it's different from the usual saloon or coffee bar where the music is not the first item on the menu."

Lester, who now lives in Jersey City and recently released a CD, "Spill My Soul," to rave reviews, has been making a name for herself on the trendy New York City art house circuit with performances in venues such as The Bitter End, Maxwell's, Dark Star and the Triad Theater.

"I try to add shade in the poetry of what I write," she said. "And SOS is a listening room, so that's great. Plus, I like performing with other writers. When you start to feel the mood of the room and the mood of the other artists, what happens is that it's almost like we start putting on some kind of a play."

In addition to giving artists a

place for their music to be heard, SOS hopes to build on Ambler's strong music tradition.

The playhouse — which hosts routine cabaret shows between

its lineup of plays and musicals — sits across the street from the former Ambler Cabaret, once a popular national touring stop for bands, artists and top regional acts.

"We want this to put Ambler on the map," said Lee, "and support what the theater is about, as well as original music. The creative spirit is alive here. We're just continuing it."
